This information will be of value to community stakeholders, including health and social service organizations, to inform planning and identify priority areas. These tables were produced by the Social Planning Council of Cambridge and North Dumfries based on Statistics Canada Census data provided through the Community Social Data Strategy (CSDS).

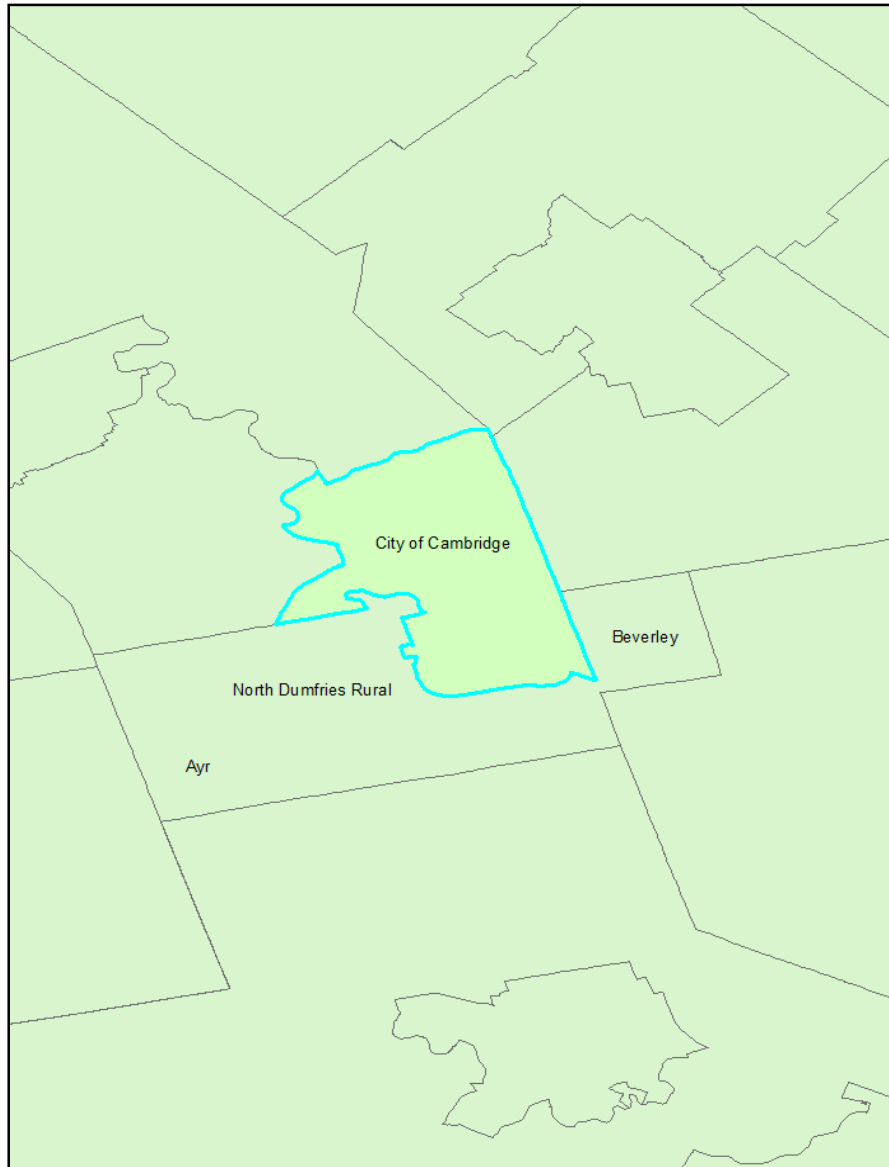
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TOWNSHIP OF NORTH DUMFRIES PLANNING DISTRICTS



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PLANNING DISTRICT HIGHLIGHTS – AYR

1. Population growth and age distribution

- In 2006 there were 3775 residents in this planning district, which was approximately 42% of the population of the township as a whole.
- The total population increased by 4.1% between 2001 and 2006, compared to 3.4% for all of North Dumfries.
- The population aged 0-14 experienced a decrease between 2001 and 2006. All other age groups increased during the same period, with the population aged 75+ experiencing the greatest change.

2. Housing

- Both the actual number and the proportion of rented occupied private dwellings increased between 2001 and 2006.
- In 2006 this planning district had a lower proportion of rented occupied private dwellings (10.3%) than the township as a whole (11.8%).
- Between 2001 and 2006 there was a 9.2% decrease in the proportion of renters paying more than 30% of their household income on rent.
- The proportion of owner-occupied private dwellings decreased slightly during this same period.

3. Families

- The proportion of couple families decreased, while the proportion of lone parent families increased between 2001 and 2006.

4. Seniors Living Arrangements

- Between 2001 and 2006 there was an increase in the number of seniors living alone. The percentage of seniors living alone in this planning district was much higher (95.2%) than in the township as a whole (66.7%).

5. Home Language, Mother Tongue, and Visible Minorities

- Between 2001 and 2006 the proportion of people reporting English as their home language decreased slightly.
- The most common non-official home languages were German, Serbian, Hungarian, Amharic and Punjabi.
- The proportion of visible minorities was higher in this planning district (2.3%) than in the township as a whole (1.5%). The top three visible minorities were Black, Chinese and South Asian.

6. Amount of Income, Low Income and Incidence of Low Income

- The average census family income and the average employment income increased from 2001 to 2006.
- The proportion of people with employment income went down slightly during this period.
- The incidence of low income in economic families went up slightly from 2001 to 2006.

7. Labour Force Participation

- The unemployment rate for youth aged 15-24 increased from 8.1% in 2001 to 10.3% in 2006. The unemployment rate for people 25 years and older increased as well (from 1.4% to 3.2%).
- There was an increase in the number of females with children participating in the labour force between 2001 and 2006.

PLANNING DISTRICT HIGHLIGHTS – BEVERLEY

1. Population growth and age distribution

- In 2006 there were 1160 residents in this planning district, which was approximately 13% of the population of the township as a whole.
- The total population increased by 6.9% between 2001 and 2006, compared to 3.4% for all of North Dumfries.
- The population aged 0-14 stayed fairly constant between 2001 and 2006. During this time period the population aged 15-24 decreased slightly and the adult population increased, with the population aged 75+ experiencing the greatest increase.

2. Housing

- Both the actual number and the proportion of rented occupied private dwellings increased between 2001 and 2006.
- In 2006 this planning district had a lower proportion of rented occupied private dwellings (10.8%) than the township as a whole (11.8%).
- Between 2001 and 2006 there was an increase in the number of rented occupied private dwellings paying more than 30% of their household income on rent.
- The proportion of owner-occupied private dwellings decreased during the same period.

3. Families

- The proportion of couple families increased while the proportion of lone parent families decreased between 2001 and 2006.

PLANNING DISTRICT HIGHLIGHTS – ND RURAL

- In 2006 there were 4120 residents in this planning district, which was approximately 45% of the population of the township as a whole.
- The total population increased by 1.9% between 2001 and 2006, compared to 3.4% for all of North Dumfries.
- The child and youth populations decreased between 2001 and 2006. The adult population increased during the same time period.

2. Housing

- Both the actual number and the proportion of rented occupied private dwellings increased between 2001 and 2006.
- In 2006 this planning district had a higher proportion of rented occupied private dwellings (13.4%) than the township as a whole (11.8%).
- Between 2001 and 2006 there was a decrease in the number of rented occupied private dwellings paying more than 30% of their household income on rent.
- The proportion of owner-occupied private dwellings decreased during the same period.

3. Families

- The proportion of lone parent families increased between 2001 and 2006.

4. Seniors Living Arrangements

- Between 2001 and 2006 there was a decrease in the number of seniors living alone. The percentage of seniors living alone in this planning district was lower (45.5%) than in the township as a whole (66.7%).

5. Home Language, Mother Tongue, and Visible Minorities

- Between 2001 and 2006 the proportion of people reporting English as their home language decreased slightly.
- The most common non-official home languages were Portuguese, Italian, Punjabi, Slovak and Slovenian.
- The proportion of visible minorities was lower in this planning district (1.0%) than in the township as a whole (1.5%).

6. Amount of Income, Low Income and Incidence of Low Income

- The average census family income and the average employment income increased from 2001 to 2006.
- The proportion of people with employment income went up during this period.
- The incidence of low income in economic families went down from 2001 to 2006.

7. Labour Force Participation

- The unemployment rate for youth aged 15-24 increased from 7.8% in 2001 to 11.0% in 2006. The unemployment rate for people 25 years and older decreased (from 2.7% to 1.9%).
- The number of females with children participating in the labour force increased between 2001 and 2006.

APPENDIX A: GLOSSARY OF SELECTED CENSUS TERMS

Definitions have been adapted from the Statistics Canada 2006 Census Dictionary, accessed online at: <http://www12.statcan.ca/english/census06/reference/dictionary/atoz.cfm>

Age refers to the age of a person (or subject) of interest at last birthday (or relative to a specified, well-defined reference date).

Census family refers to a married couple (with or without children of either or both spouses), a couple living common-law (with or without children of either or both partners) or a lone parent of any marital status, with at least one child living in the same dwelling. A couple may be of opposite or same sex. 'Children' in a census family include grandchildren living with their grandparent(s) but with no parents present.

Economic family refers to a group of two or more persons who live in the same dwelling and are related to each other by blood, marriage, common-law or adoption. A couple may be of opposite or same sex. For 2006, foster children are included.

Educational attainment refers to the highest level of schooling a person has attained in terms of grades of elementary or secondary school completed and certificates or diplomas obtained. It also refers to post secondary institutions attended and certificates, degrees or diplomas granted.

Family structure refers to the combination of relatives that comprise a family. Classification on this variable considers the presence or absence of: legally married spouses or common law partners; children; and, in the case of economic families, other relatives.

Home language refers to the language spoken most often or on a regular basis at home by the individual at the time of the census.

Household applies to a person or group of people who occupy the same dwelling and do not have a usual place of residence elsewhere in Canada or abroad. The dwelling may be either a collective dwelling or a private dwelling. The household may consist of a family group such as a census family, of two or more families sharing a dwelling, of a group of unrelated persons or of a person living alone.

Immigration concerns the movement of nationals of any given country to another country for the purpose of settlement. It applies to a person who has been granted the right to permanently live in Canada by immigration authorities. It usually applies to persons born outside Canada but may also apply to a small number of persons born inside Canada to parents who are foreign nationals. Similarly, some small number of persons who are Canadian by birth have been born outside Canada to Canadian parents. Once a person has been accorded immigrant status it becomes a life-long attribute as long as the person lives in Canada. Therefore, immigrants are often further classified by period of immigration in order to distinguish between recent immigrants and earlier immigrants.

Labour force refers to persons who are either employed or unemployed during the week (Sunday to Saturday) prior to Census Day (May 16, 2006).

Lone-parent family includes families containing only one parent with his or her child(ren)

Low income after-tax cutoffs are estimated independently for economic families and persons not in economic families based upon family expenditure and income after tax. Consequently the low income after-tax cut-offs are set at after-tax income levels, differentiated by size of family and area of residence, where families spend 20 percentage points more of their after-tax income than the average family on food, shelter and clothing.

The following is the 2005 matrix of low income after-tax cut-offs (1992 base) for economic families and persons not in economic families:

Mobility and migration concerns the movement of persons from one place to another. It includes persons who, in a specified reference period have not moved or have moved from one residence to another. The former are referred to as non-movers and the latter as movers. Movers include non-migrants and migrants. Non-migrants are persons who did move but remained in the same city, town, township, village or Indian Reserve. Migrants include internal migrants who moved to a different city, town, township, village or Indian Reserve within Canada. External migrants include persons who lived outside Canada at the earlier reference date. These external migrants include landed immigrants who moved to Canada but also Canadian-born persons who were out of the country but returned during the reference period.

Mother tongue refers to the first language a person learned at home in childhood and still understands.

Non-official language refers to the language(s) spoken by a person (other than English or French) well enough to conduct a conversation.

Official language refers to the ability of a person to conduct a conversation in English only, in French only, in both English and French or in neither English nor French.

Population density is the number of persons per square kilometer.

Presence of children refers to the number of children in private households by age groups.

Prevalence of low income after tax is measured by the percentage of economic families or persons not in economic families who spend 20% more of their after-tax income than average on food, shelter and clothing.

Private dwelling is defined as a set of living quarters designed for or converted for human habitation in which a person or group of persons reside or could reside. In addition, a private dwelling must have a source of heat or power and must be an enclosed space that provides shelter from the elements, as evidenced by complete and enclosed walls and roof and by doors and windows that provide protection from wind, rain and snow.

Visible minority refers to whether or not a person, under criteria established by the Employment Equity Act, is non-Caucasian in race or non-white in colour. Under the Act, an Aboriginal person is not considered to be a Visible Minority
